Workshop with audience participation: Designing Post-Work Futures in the EU

Automation, robotisation and AI are fundamentally reshaping jobs, workplaces and the role of work in people's lives. Rather than asking only which occupations may disappear in the coming years, this interactive workshop explores how work, professional identities and human values may be redefined in a post-work society. Drawing on international research projects, including SONATA, MAGNET and the forthcoming REWORK project, it combines applied anthropology with research on the future of offices and workplaces. Participants will examine which tasks are likely to be automated, which human capabilities and skills may become more important, and how workplaces can continue to support a sense of togetherness, belonging, cooperation and meaning. The workshop will also consider whether automation could help eliminate what anthropologist David Graeber called "bullshit jobs" and whether universal basic income (UBI) could enable fairer and more meaningful ways of organising life beyond paid employment. Working in interdisciplinary groups, participants will develop scenarios for desirable work and post-work futures in the EU and beyond. The main outcome will be a practical post-work readiness framework with recommendations for policymakers, employers, researchers and civil society.
